State Street in Dallas, is a photo of what is now known as Lake Street. The section of that street which appears in last week's photo is the area where Commonwealth Telephone Company is currently the Harveys Lake Highway What we have learned is that the located

Street in Dallas was the first to call last Wednesday to identify the photo. Mr. Elston claims the photo was probably taken around 1917 and that State Street was later known as
