LOS ANGELES — Patrick Mary Ann Maxin, Executive Director of the Student Assistance Council, said that in the past 12 years, hundreds of students have found scholarships ranging from \$500 to \$10,000 a year through the use of Scholarship Search computers.

Thousands of awards, including \$100,000,000 computer information bank containing \$50,000 donor awards, are being privately-funded from government sources, foundations, trust funds, embassies, religious, fraternal and social organizations, unions, associations, professional and civic groups, colleges and universities, and other donors.

Additional computer processing fee is required at the time the student sends in his or her application form. Applicants can often qualify for privately-donated college funds in the Scholarship Search data base, because certain eligibility factors are important, such as: religion, ethnic background, career interest, college majors, extracurricular school or civic activities, parents unions, military service, etc.
