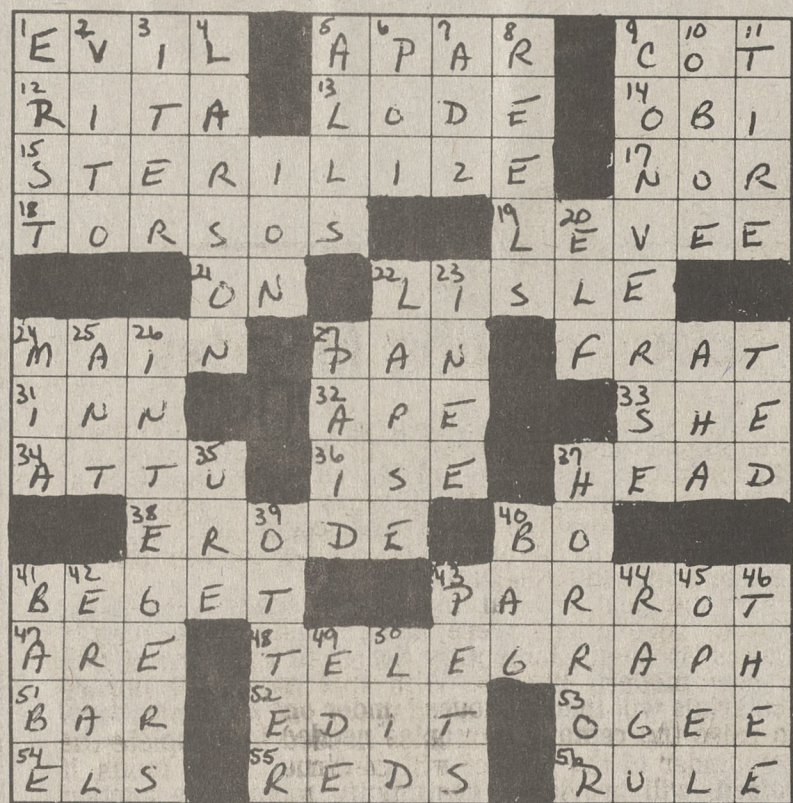
The Lower Level Information Desk is looking for volunteers to provide patients with directions to the hospital's outpatient services. Monday and Friday afternoons are open.

Candystripping Supervisors are needed Sunday afternoon or evening. Supervisors offer guidance to candy strippers, ages 13 to 16, and assist various hospital departments and nursing units in scheduling and operation of the program.

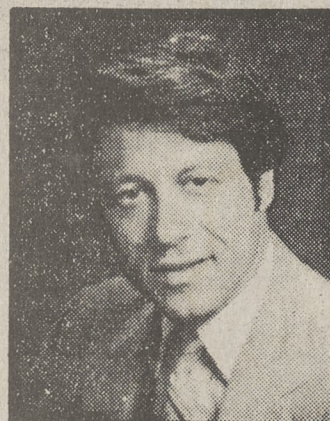
