O'Connor, then rector of the North American Church, Bishop Timlin served as assistant pastor of St. John the Evangelist Parish, Pittston and St. Peter's Cathedral, Scranton, before being named assistant chancellor of the diocese and secretary to Most Rev. J. Carroll McCormick, D.D., sixth Bishop of Scranton, in 1966

Bishop Timlin was appointed Champlain to Pope Paul VI in 1967, became Chancellor o the diocese in 1971 and was named a Prelate of Honor of the Pope in 1972.

He was named Auxiliary Bishop and became Vicar General of the Diocese of Scranton in 1976, was named pastor of the Church of the Nativity of our Lord in 1979, and became the eighth Bishop of the Scranton Diocese in 1984.

Bishop Timlin has served on the Consultative Committee on Vocations, chairman of the Diocesan Liturgical Commission, as a member of the Board of Consultors, chairman of St. Pius X Seminary and chairman of the Preparatory Commissions for the Diocesan Synod in 1983.
