Pennsylvania is fortunate in having thousands of miles of canoeable waterways - ranging from the booming whitewaters of the Lehigh and Youghiogheny to the flowing rivers to the tranquil lakes nestled in the hills throughout the Commonwealth. The 36-page booklet is designed to

help the canoeing enthusiast choose the right waterway for a fun-filled canoeing adventure.

According to Virgil Chambers, Chief of the Commission's Boating Safety Education Section, there are many marvelous things to be seen in Pennsylvania by canoe and "Paddle Pennsylvania" will help you choose the right waterway. The booklet also contains guidelines for planning a float trip, a section on canoe safety and a 9" x 15" pull-out canoe map showing canoe trips designed for novice paddlers, the intermediate canoeist and the experienced whitewater enthusiast.
