With four burglaries **Edwardsville man charged**

At a preliminary hearing held before District Magistrate Leonard Harvey, Owen Davis, 26, of 126 Short Street Edwardsville was charged with the Short Street, Edwardsville, was charged with the burglaries of four Back Mountain residences.

The charges, which were filed against Davis by Dallas Borough Police Chief Ed Lyons, include two counts of burglary, two counts of receiving stolen property and one count of criminal conspiracy.

These stem from incidents which occurred at the homes of James B. Post, Highland Blvd., Dallas, on December 11, 1984 and Marion Kunigonis, Reservoir Rd., Dallas on January 7, 1985. According to Chief Lyons, items taken in the thefts include jewelry, silver and valuable papers valued at a total of over \$20,000. Lehman Township patrolman Dennis Dobinick also filed similar charges against the Edwardsville man. These include burglary, criminal trespassing, and theft by unlawful taking.

The Lehman Township homes involved were the residences of Royal Culp, Huntsville Rd., on January 9, 1985 and Gerald Clark, Route 118 on December 23, 1984. In both cases, valuable including jewelry, silver and guns were taken.

A Prima Facie case was established and Davis was remanded to the Luzerne County Prison to await trial by a Luzerne County Court on a date to be announced. An accomplice, Kenneth Moran of 7 Pugh St., Edwardsville, was arraigned before Magistrate Harvey on April 11, and a preliminary hearing date was scheduled for Wednesday, April 17.
