Block captains live on the block, act as a sounding board for the neighbors, attend training sessions and perform canvassing duties. These include making an assessment of properties on the block, which they have learned to do in a training session, explaining to each neighbor how to actively observe and accurately report suspicious activities, hand out decals, and

other assorted duties. It's important to note that the decals themselves, prominently displayed in a window, are a big deterent to crime. The block captain will detail other facets of the crime watch including 'Operation Identification' and the 'Home Security Survey' to each of the neighbors. He is contacted if any calls are made to the police from his block and he encourages active participation in the program.

The individual in each home is the key. Through observation - looking and listening, then reporting any-

thing suspicious to the police, concerned citizens can cut down the incidence of crime in their neighborhoods. Through the Neighborhood Crime Watch Program, persons learn how to be good observers. Neighbors share creime prevention tips. They can exchange home and work telephone numbers and information about daily routines or planned vacations.

According to Bradshaw, Neighborhood Crime Watches work. "In my neighborhood, seven burlaries occurred in a 10-day period,"

Bradshaw said. "One year after we began our crime watch, there were four attempted burglaries reported during the year. A Neighborhood Crime Watch won't stop crime," he says, "but it will move it to another area - one where no crime watch has been organized!"

When asked if he recalled the conversation with Mr. Bradshaw, Chief Lyons stated that it had been a very brief discussion and that he didn't remember what was said.
According to Lyons, "Officer Jack

Fowler was placed in charge of initiating the crime watch. He got the information and discussed it with the Weisses. We offered to let them use the Borough building for their meetings. It was up to the Weisses to contact neighbors and set a date for a crime watch meeting. Apparently, they never did. Mr. Weiss himself said he was too busy. It's right there in the paper." Chief Lyons then concluded, "I have no further comment until I discuss this with Jack Fowler.'

Ed Weiss claims it was up to the police to follow through and get the crime watch started.

"We're the victims. As taxpayers we have the right to be protected by our police," he said. "Our dollars pay Ed Lyons' salary. They (the police) should be doing everything they can to help us instead of saying it is our responsibility. Besides, we're very back seat people. We don't like to be in the limelight.

There aren't any other reasons.' Bradshaw, when discussing the situation, remarked "I don't know

why no one ever got back to me; in fact, I was surprised no one did. It was my impression that the Weisses were going to contact neighbors, set a date, then let Mr. Fowler know. Fowler was then going to get in touch with me and let me know what date had been chosen. That was the last I had heard. The Neighborhood Crime Watch Association is still very willing to help and will if we are asked, but I'm not going to push myself on anyone.'
