Bicyclists, motorists equal

Bicyclists and motorists have equal rights on the road; and therefore have equal responsibility for each others safety, a Penn State Extension Safety expert says.

"Bicyclists are responsible for the same traffic codes that motorists are. Four out of five accidents occur when a bicyclist violates traffic rules," according to Dennis Murphy, assistant professor of agricultural economics extension.

"But motorists should not take any consolation in this fact, because a bicyclist is seriously injured in an accident."

More than 1,000 people were killed and 400,000 injured on bicycles last year. The more shocking statistic, Murphy says, is that children ages 14 and under are killed in 42 percent of all fatal bicycle accidents.

Bicyclists and motorists should think about working together on safety. Bicyclists can help by learning the rules of the road; obeying street signs, using hand turn signals and practicing caution in the dar or on bad road conditions.

Motorists shouldn't crowd bicyclists on turns or tailgate bicycles.
