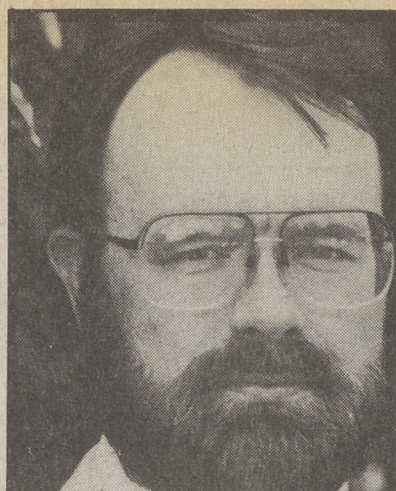


# Woman's network sweeps area

## Two named to Leadership W-B

Howard M. Levinson of Dallas, Rita M. Brody of Sweet Valley, Donald R. Dodson of Plymouth, and Kerry D. Freeman of Dallas are enrolled in the current Leadership Wilkes-Barre program which trains community leaders.

They are among the 26 persons from the Wilkes-Barre area participating in the 10-month program which is the equivalent of a college course. Applications for the next year's program are now being reviewed.

Levinson is a partner with Rosenn, Jenkins and Greenwald whose law degree is from Georgetown University Law Center. He has a Bachelor's Degree from Lehigh University and also studies at the Universities of Hamburg and Bonn in West Germany.

His legal experience includes serving as Deputy Attorney General first in the division of property and natural resources and then in the office of civil litigation in Harrisburg; and as a law clerk with Max M. Golbert in Washington, and as tax researcher in the office of Congressman William Green. He is second vice president of Temple B'nai B'rith and a board member of Jewish Family Service.

Mrs. Brody is administrative staff and services manager for Commonwealth Telephone Company in Dallas, responsible for the administrative and services functions for the Operations Group of the company. She has worked in the Wyoming Valley area for 14 years, and

is presently enrolled in the information systems certificate program at King's College. She was selected as the "Outstanding Student" for sales presentation techniques when she represented CT Co. at the USITA People Dynamics Sales Seminar.

She is chaplain of the Dallas Chapter of Order of the Eastern Star and a member of the advisory committee for the Lake-Lehman High School Business Department. She has been a volunteer fund raiser for the local fire company and has been a volunteer for the 4 H Club. She is the mother of two children.

Freeman works for the Trane Company in Wilkes-Barre as a sales engineer marketing residential, commercial and industrial H.V.A.C. equipment to architects, engineers and contractors. A professional engineer (P.E.), he is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin in mechanical engineering. He was a member of the Top Ten Club in 1983 at The Trane Co. and served as president of the Anthracite Chapter of the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air Conditioning Engineers. He is chairman of the Region III Conference of that organization to be held in Northeastern Pennsylvania in 1987.

Active in the Back Mountain, Freeman has served as president and vice president of the Dallas Rotary Club and as president, vice president, auction chairman and building committee chairman of the Back Mountain Memorial Library.

A new phenomenon is sweeping across part of Northeastern Pennsylvania as a new resource for improving the region's quality of life. This trend is the growing role of a women's network designed to share experiences in order to improve the role of women in the region or portions thereof, and to increase their participation in leadership positions and help improve the region's quality of life.

Among the more recent local efforts is the planning for a major woman's conference to be held at the Wilkes-Barre Penn State University Campus on Saturday, June 1, 1985. Many organizations in Luzerne County, as well as elsewhere have agreed to co-sponsor this meeting, including the Economic Development Council of Northeastern Pennsylvania. The goals of the conference are to accomplish the following:

To inform; to bring women together; to promote cooperation among organizations; to encourage leadership by women in the county; to demonstrate support for issues of concern to women; to develop a network of communications; to raise the consciousness of women to the resources available to them in the county; to

make women aware of how they can improve the quality of life for everyone in the county; to promote the equality to women.

The development of leadership for males and females throughout Northeastern Pennsylvania is an important regional objective. Programs to expand leadership skills are being led by the Leadership Wilkes-Barre and Leadership Lackawanna Programs which each train approximately 25 persons a year and provide substantial background in leadership skills and issues concerning areas of Northeastern Pennsylvania served by the programs.

Providing opportunities for women to advance through the leadership training program and to become part of a community's decision making process is an important element of the leadership programs. Within the community, conferences and workshops are being held targeted to women such as those sponsored or developed through the efforts of the Small Business Administration, Small Business Centers located at Wilkes College at the University of Scranton, and other organizations. This helps to develop technical information enabling women to continue to enter or expand business opportunities.

The skills offered by all citizens of Northeastern Pennsylvania need to be utilized to their fullest extent. The economic characteristics of

Northeastern Pennsylvania cause two heads of households to work, thus increasing the likelihood of women in the work force, but not necessarily women in positions of leadership.

The latter is an issue which needs to be addressed in order to draw upon the multitude of talent which can help promote the best interests of Northeastern Pennsylvania. In the 1980's and 1990's, effective leadership is needed more than ever before if Northeastern Pennsylvania is to compete with its sister regions. This is true in all the disciplines which make up the lifestyle of the region including, but not limited to, political, economic, social, environmental, physical, educational, cultural and all others. Much can be gained by the deliberate involvement of all parts of Northeastern Pennsylvania's demographic, age group, and male-female sectors. Much can be lost if the process is not wide enough to involve all of these groups.

Thus, the forthcoming women's conference, the other activities which involve women's networks throughout the region, and other types of similar endeavors are critical to the capacity building which will be required as Northeastern Pennsylvania heads to the twenty-first century.

5:30 a.m. (breakfast is served all day), a lunch buffet which offers three different entree items such as chicken, fish and seafood or Nelson's famous ribs along with potatoes, vegetables and pasta; and a regular menu, featuring some of the best sandwiches in town. All buffets include the soup and salad bar. Nelson's ribs, prepared with his own 6-hour sauce, are tender and tart. 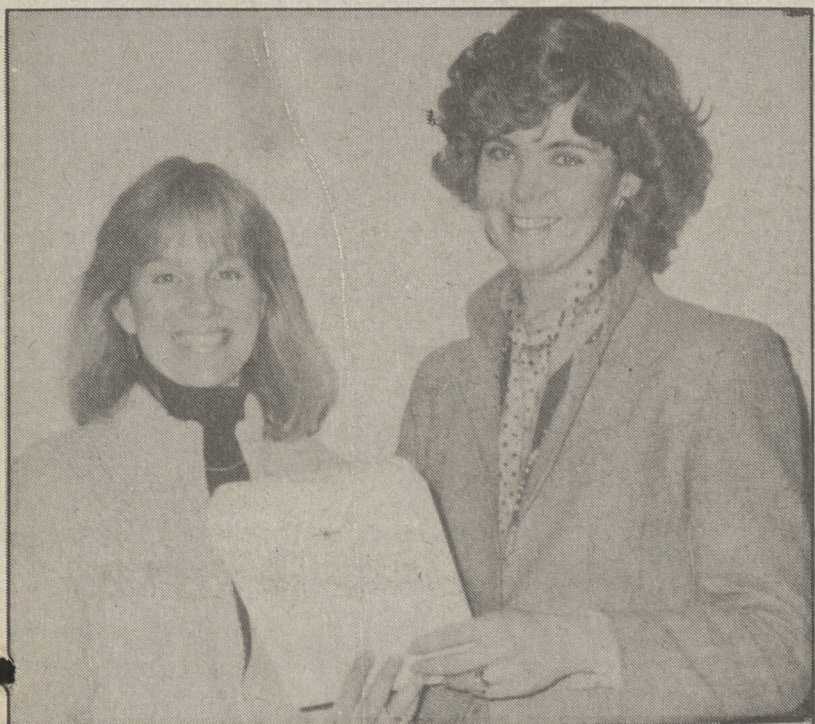
