

Coslett introduces hunting legislation

Rep. Frank Coslett has introduced legislation giving hunters five days to come up with a form of identification in addition to their license if stopped by a game protector.

"I have received a number of complaints from sportsmen who were stopped and could not come up with another form of identification," Coslett said. "As a result they faced stiff fines."

"Obviously, a number of other lawmakers have been receiving similar complaints since the bill has nearly 60 co-sponsors."

According to the Game Commission, the fine for failure to produce identification other than the hunting license is \$25 plus any court costs.

"Under my legislation, no one could be convicted of failure to produce some means of identification other than the license on their back if some means of identification could be produced within five days," Coslett said.

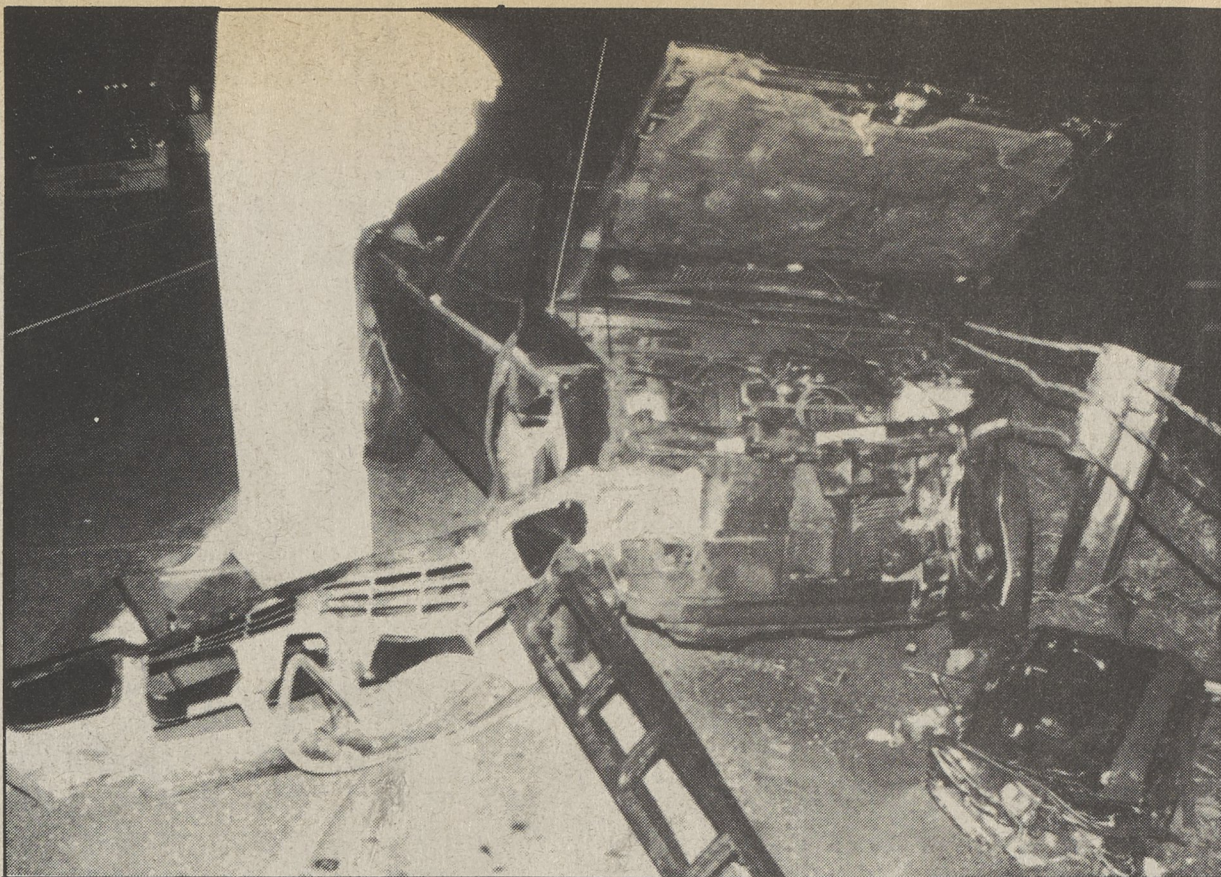
Coslett said that an additional means of identification would determine whether or not the hunter is a Pennsylvania resident.

"In many cases hunters can lose their identification, forget to carry it or are unaware of the law," he said. "I believe they should be given the same courtesy as is afforded under the vehicle code where a motorist is given five days to produce a driver's license if stopped by a policeman."

Coslett said that the co-sponsors of the bill include the chairman and minority chairman of the House

Game and Fisheries Committee, the panel where the bill will first be considered.

"I think there is an excellent chance that this bill will get favorable considerations," Coslett said.

Man killed

A three-car accident in Lehman Township over the weekend claimed the life of a Back Mountain man. Pronounced dead at the scene by William Listman, Assistant Coroner, was 41 year old William Boyle of Trucksville. The accident occurred at the intersection of Route 118 and the Huntsville/Idetown Road. Others involved in the mishap were Boyle's son, William Boyle Jr., 14; Frank Holby, of Blytheburn; Joe Debessi of Hanover Township; Jennifer Fouchs, of Meadowcrest Drive, Shavertown; and Jamie Fisher of Harveys Lake.

Police from several areas in the Back Mountain were assisted by State Police, ambulance crews, and medical units. Investigation is continuing.

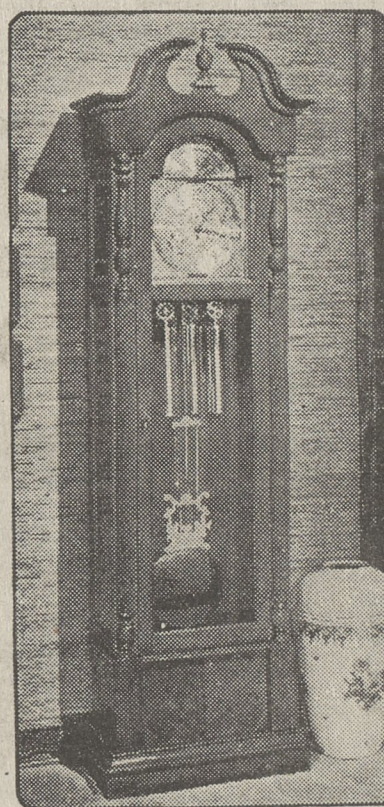

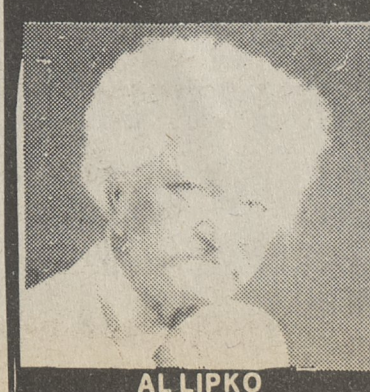
