Seminary announces programs


Wyoming Seminary College Preparatory School, Kingston, has announced plans for a 1985 Summer School program. Ten courses will be offered during two three-week sessions. Session I will run June 10-28 and Session II July 8-26. Both sessions will conduct classes Monday through Friday for three hours per

day.
Students presently enrolled in grades 7 to 11 in Wyoming Valley schools are eligible to register for any of the courses which include Session I - SAT Verbal Review,. Introductory Typing, Basic Writing Workshop, Algebra I, and Arithmatic Review (Pre-Algebra). Session II - SAT Mathematics Review, Algebra II, Elementary Spanish, Elementary French and Introduction to Computers.

Course credit will not be offered except for Introduction to Computers where Wyoming Seminary Students who pass the course will receive credit towards fulfillment of graduation requirements.

Registration deadline for Session I classes is June 1 and Session II is July 1. Costs for the courses are \$150 for the first course and \$100 for each additional course.


