Poets lauded

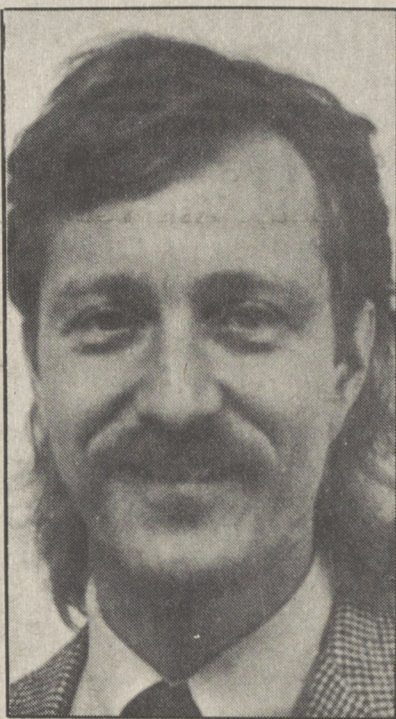

Presents paper

Dr. Robert H. Merrill, assistant professor of English at Penn State Wilkes-Barre, presented a paper at the International Congress on Medieval Studies at Western Michigan University. Some 3,000 medieval scholars participated in twentieth annual Congress.

His topic was "Sin as Cognitive Dissonance in Medieval Arthurian Romance." On May 1, Dr. Merrill also presented "Zen and the Art of Critical Thinking" at the Northeastern Pennsylvania Writing Council Conference at the University of Scranton. An article, "The Troubled World of Harold Brodkey," has recently been accepted for publication in the Denver Quarterly.

He came to the Lehman campus in 1982 and has been co-organizer of its film series as well as advisor to its student news magazine, Les Mots, which under his direction is now distributed internationally.

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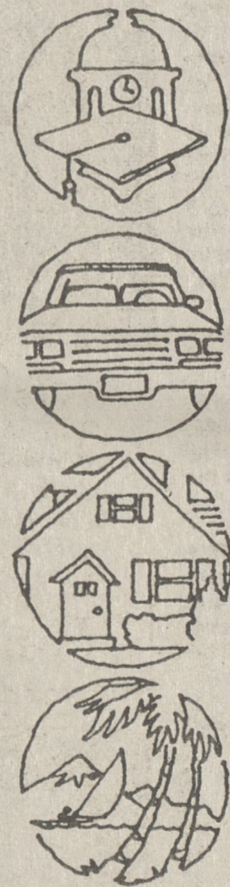


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
