Grossman stated "that the EDCNP export promotion program can provide individualized export information and assistance to businesses who are new to export or expanding their current international markets. The EDCNP export program is also unique in that the Council's export specialist is a business firm's direct access to trade shows, seminars, trade information, foreign market statistics, regulations, and correspondence to foreign commercial posts, through a close relationship with the Pennsylvania and U.S. Departments of Com-
