I recently became disabled due to surgery. Because of this I'm financially unable to afford my Blue Cross/Blue Shield payments of \$189.64 every three months. I've gone on Medical Assistance. I now carry a green medical card in my wallet. Can you please tell me if this type of insurance is as good as Blue Cross/Blue Shield? Will this insurance cover me completely if I should need further hospitalization

and or surgery? STANDING ON ONE LEG DEAR STANDING ON ONE LEG:

I cannot tell you the exact difference between the two because I do not have a copy of your Blue Cross/ Blue Shield agreement. I did find out what your green Medical Assistance card will cover. I telephoned Mr. John Gurzynski, District Office Manager of the Luzerne County Assistance Office. He said the green Medical Assistance card entitles you to inpatient and outpatient hospital care. It includes visits to the doctor. It does not cover drugs except as used as an inpatient in a hospital.

I hope this information is useful for you.


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
