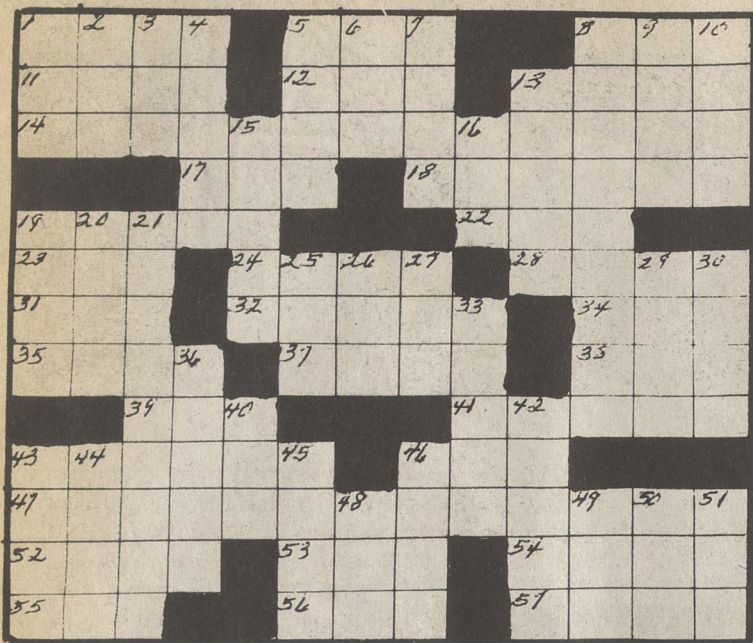


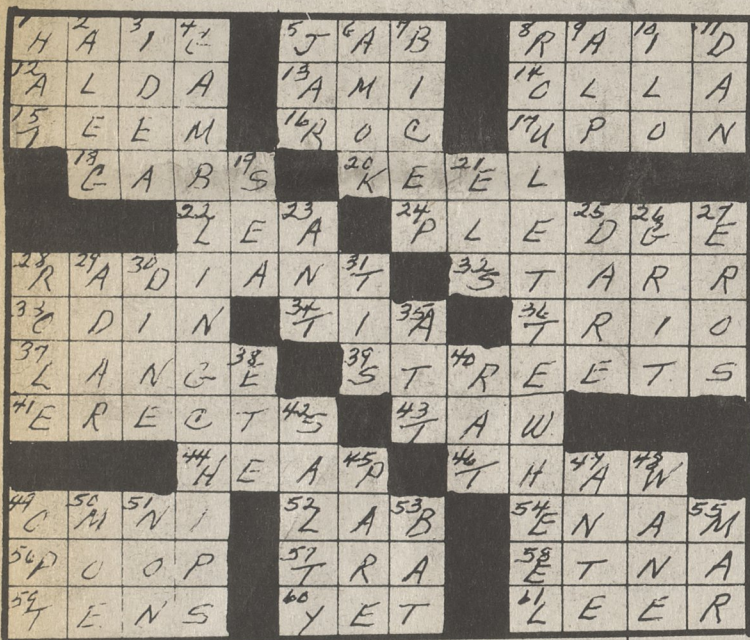

Tel Med is the free health information service available by telephone. The program is sponsored by Maternal and Family Health Services, Inc.; Blue Cross of Northeastern Pennsylvania; Pennsylvania Blue Shield; and the Senior Community Service Employment. It is endorsed by Luzerne County Medical Society. Established by the Junior League of Wilkes Barre in 1974, the league recently funded a grant to rebuild the Tel Med Board and purchase new tapes.
