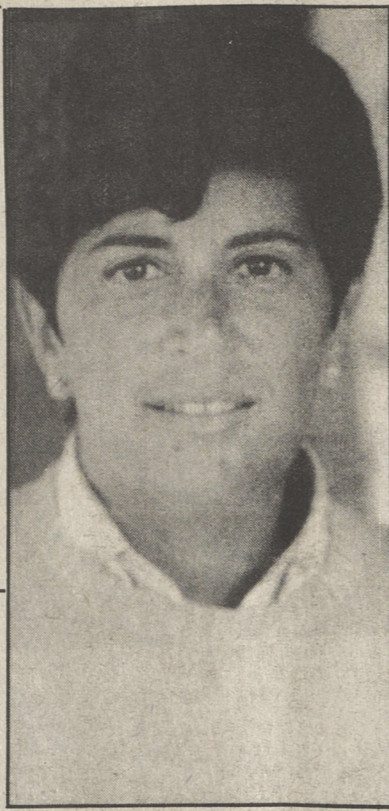

## Misericordia sets orientation

College Misericordia is gearing up for a new academic year with a two-day orientation for both new incoming students and their parents.

Orientation will be held on Saturday, August 24, and Sunday, August 25. Times for orientation programs vary throughout the day. Classes will begin at 8 a.m. on Monday, August 26.

New students and their parents will take part in tours of the campus and a welcome address in Walsh Auditorium by Dr. Joseph Fink, president, college administrators and several student leaders. They will also meet together in an academic program session with faculty from the student's chosen academic discipline.

During Saturday evening, all students and their parents will meet in the cafeteria with Dr. Joseph Rogan, director of the Developmental Education Program. Topics of discussion will include the Freshman Testing Project, Academic Workshop Project and the Alternative Learners Project. Evening leisure activities will consist of various sports activities. Combined parent-student programming will conclude with a Folk Mass on Sunday morning.

On Sunday, students will meet informally in small groups with an orientation student leader in order to ask questions they may have. They will also meet with their academic advisors and register for classes.

Both resident and commuter stu-

dents will have the opportunity to meet separately in order to discuss any special concerns. Sunday's orientation will end with an outdoor band concert and picnic.

A special program specifically for parents has also been designed for orientation. On Saturday, a workshop entitled "Parents' Concern" will be conducted by Sister Martha Hanlon, RSM, dean of students and David Payne, dean of admissions. In addition, representatives from

the financial aid and billing offices will address financial related topics. In order to provide parents the chance to socialize with faculty and administrators, a parent's reception will be held on Saturday evening in McHale Hall Lounge and patio area.

Rules and Regulations for Safety and Comfort of Students riding

School Buses:  
A. GENERAL REGULATIONS:  
1. Obey the bus driver at all times.  
2. Students will be picked up and discharged only at the school or at their assigned bus stops.  
3. Students not assigned to a bus may not ride that bus.  
4. Chaperones on extra-curricular buses are to be respected and their instructions followed.  
5. Report problems to your driver or to the principal of your school.

B. PREVIOUS TO LOADING:  
1. Be on time at the bus stop designated by the school bus driver.  
2. Stay off the road at all times while waiting for the bus.  
3. Behave in a safe and courteous manner while waiting for the bus.  
4. Do not approach the bus until it stops completely.  
5. Enter the bus in a single file, girls first, or as directed by your driver.

C. WHILE ON THE BUS:  
1. At all times, sit in the seat assigned by the driver.  
2. Deep your hands and head inside the bus.  
3. Do not throw anything in the bus or out the bus windows.  
4. For safety sake, place nothing in the aisle of the bus.  
5. Avoid loud laughing and talking and unnecessary confusion that may divert the driver's attention and cause an accident. (Absolute quiet when approaching a railroad cross-

ing.)  
6. Be courteous to your fellow pupils, the bus driver, and all others.  
7. Do not participate in horse play in or around the bus.  
8. Help look after the safety and comfort of younger students.  
9. Do not tamper with the bus or its equipment. Treat all bus equipment as you should valuable furniture in your home. (Repair costs must be paid by the offender.)  
D. AFTER LEAVING THE BUS:  
1. Avoid leaving books, lunches, and other articles on the bus.  
2. Cross the road at least 100 feet in front of the bus, but then only after being sure that no traffic is approaching from either direction.  
3. Help look after the safety of younger children.  
4. Be alert to danger signals from the driver.  
Procedure to be followed in case of infractions of the above rules and regulations:  
1. Initial misbehavior - admonishment by the driver.  
2. Continued infractions (First

Report to School Principal)  
a. Conference with Principal  
b. Notice of infraction is sent to the student's parents  
c. Serious offenses, such as smoking, throwing fire crackers, or the like, will be treated as "second report" offenses.  
3. Further continuance of infraction. (Second Report to the Principal)  
a. Upon verification of facts, one week's suspension from riding the

school bus.  
b. Notice sent to the parents.  
4. Insistent infractions of the rules (Third Report to the Principal).  
a. Extended forfeiture of privilege to ride the school bus.  
b. Conference between the parents of the student, the bus driver, and the school officials before that student may resume riding the bus.  
5. Non-bus students reported for bus offenses will be treated as if the offense had occurred in the school.
