# **Misericordia to host** Mercy's Awarenes week

The week of Sept. 23 has been designated Mission Awareness-Mercy Week at College Misericordia in honor of the Religious Sisters of Mercy who serve in this region of Pennsylvania.

According to college chaplain Father Jack Bendik, the campus community makes the week sur-rounding Mercy Day, Sept. 24, a celebration of the Sisters.

Scheduled events include live entertainment, movies, Luv-A-Nun program for retired Sisters, hayrides, a bonfire and sing-a-long, Appreciation Dinner, special masses and a convocation by Monsignor Andrew J. McGowan, chair-man of the board of trustees. His address will discuss "The Meaning of the Mission."

Founded in Ireland in 1831 by Mother Catherine McAuley, the Sis-ters of Mercy came to the United States in 1841. By 1910 the Sisters had pioneered in the Scranton Diocese for 35 years, establishing elementary, secondary and night schools as well as Mercy Hospital in Wilkes-Barre. College Misericordia was dedicated in September 1924 as the first institution of higher learning in Luzerne County

According to Dr. Regina Kelly,

RSM, author of books on Mother McCauley and the college, Mercy Day is traditionally celebrated by Sisters around the world on Sept. 24, the Feast of Our Lady of Mercy on the church calendar. "We are the largest English-speaking order with approximately 20,000 members

worldwide," stated Kelly. Most religions take three vows, continued Kelly. "The Sisters of Mercy take a fourth vow of service to the poor, the sick and the uneducated. We have established more than 120 Mercy health care facilities across the nation. In fact, Mercy hospitals make up the second largest hospital system in the country, next to the Veterans's Administration. We also sponsor 19 Mercy colleges andover 75 secondary schools. These facilities enable us to effectively fulfill our vow of service."

"Mercy Day is a congregational celebration of the charismas of the Sisters of Mercy," said college president, Dr. Joseph Fink. "This year we are combining our tribute to our sponsoring body with an emphasis on an awareness of the mission of our college. Few groups have had as significant an impact on the lives of area people as the Sisters of Mercy.

Learn to grow plants indoors

If you have not made indoor gardening part of your interior decorating, this fall may be a good time to start.

The wide range of plants that can be successfully grown indoors and the ways they can be displayed can help you become a creative decorator.

For those who need help in choosing and or caring for houseplants, Penn State specialists have written two courses.

One course, titled Houseplant Culture, provides basic information about growing plants indoors. It includes lighting, heat, and humidity control, suitable soil mixes, disease, and containers. Some plants that stand adverse conditions are listed.

The other course is Selection of Indoor Plants. It describes species suitable for a variety of environments; foliage plants for shade and low-light intensities; plants for semi-sun; and plants for full sun. Additional lessons discuss how to force bulbs for winter bloom indoors, how to successfully raise succulents, and plants to choose for greenhouse growing.
