# Dallas booters tie Sem, 0-0

Dallas High School soccer team, scheduled to play two games last week, were successful in playing only the game scheduled with Wyoming Seminary, Thursday, Sept .26, which ended in 0-0 tie, after four regular 20 minute periods nd two five minute overtimes.

Earlier in the week, the Mountaineers' game with Abington Heights was postponed due to bad field conditions and was rescheduled for Oct. 11 at Dallas.

The game between the Blue Knights of Wyoming Seminary and the Dallas Mountaineers was one of the most exciting this season, according to Dallas Coach John McCafferty. Both teams came on the field determined to win and it showed throughout the entire

Seminary's offense was counteracted by the Dallas defense and the Blue Knights' Chris Saul, their star striker, was held ineffective by the Mountaineers.

With the Mountaineers star striker Wally Gauthier out of the Seminary game, McCafferty had to change his game play and it showed in the letdown in the usual strong Dallas offense.

Blue Knight Jay Antinnes started roving over the field in the second period and created several scoring opportunities, but the young Dallas defense did a tremendous job in holding the Sem offense off.

In the third period, Saul and Antinnes tried to work a scoring play, but Dallas goaltender Gerry Mihalick sensed what they intended and beat Antinnes to the ball, smothering it.

In the first period, Dallas had an opportunity to score when a ball passed back to Seminary's Bucky Hughes slid under his feet and Dallas' Mark Richardson caught up to it 20 feet to the left of Sem's sure his opponent and Richardson slipped as he kicked the ball missing the goal.

Referees were kept busy in the second half as both teams became more physical with each team answering a scoring rush with a rush of its own.

A Dallas scoring opportunity in the last minute of the fourth period was cleared by Sem's sweeper Tom Imperiale and the game went into overtime.

Seminary had two opportunities to score in the overtime periods, but both times Mountaineer goaltender Gerry Mihalick smothered the ball before it went over the goal line.
