King's College has been awarded a \$50,000 grant by the Gladys Brook Foundation, New York, to establish an endowment to provide scholarships to academically gifted students, according to the Rev. Laurence M. Olszewski, C.S.C., director of development at the college.

According to Olszewski, King's was awarded the grant primarily because of its outstanding reputation for the academic excellence of its students. In the past three years alone, King's has had three students earn Fulbright Scholarships and one student earned a National Science Foundation Scholarship.

According to Olszewski, funds from the grant will be placed in a perpetual endowment with the interest earned being used to provide scholarships to academically gifted students. The first scholarships to be offered as a result of the grant will be available to the freshman class entering King's in September 1986.

The Gladys Brooks Foundation was created in 1981 under the will of the late Gladys Brooks Thayer of New York. Its purposes is to provide for the intellectual, moral and physical welfare of the people of the country by establishing and supporting non-profit libraries, educational institutions, hospitals and clinics.
