# Wrestling program teaches youngsters

"takedown" "reverse", "go for it", are words heard often in the Lake-Lehman School District recently, especially among elementary stu-dents. They are "words" the students are learning in the PTA elementary wrestling program.

Approximately 60 students from all sections of the district are participating in the Lake-Lehman PTA Sponsored Elementary Wrestling Program. All of these boys are students in grades three, four, five or six, eligible to take part in the program held every Saturday morning at the senior high school, or if in fifth or sixth grade in the Lehman-Jackson building, they have the opportunity to wrestle during the afternoon recess at least one, and possibly two days per week.


The program is not new to the Lake-Lehman District. It was first started by former coach "Shorty" Hitchcock, when he was at Lake-Lehman, according to Gary Norconk, one of the program instructors.

This year, however, there appears to be more enthusiasm among the would-be grapplers and about 30 boys show up every Saturday morning, and another 30 are coming out at the Lehman-Jackson Building.

The program, sponsored by the Lake-Lehman PTA, began Saturday, Jan. 11, and will continue every Saturday until the middle of March. The participants report to the senior high school wretling room at 10 a.m. and participate until noon.

Unlike the Back Mountain Elementary Wrestling Club, the Lake-Lehman program is not a competitive organization.

It is a non-competitive, instructional but fun, exercise program designed to give the boys the "feel" of wrestling. Rusty Coolbaugh, former Lake-Lehman wrestler; Vito Pilosi, former

wrestler; and Gary Norconk, are conducting the program.

give the boys an opportunity to take part in activities which are "The aim of our program is to healthful and conditioning, as well as have fun and achieve success," said Norconk. "We teach basic wrestling instruction, do tumbling, gymnastics and play games for about an hour and a half," said Norconk. "We usually spend the last half hour

doing basic wrestling moves." At the end of the program, the directors will have an in-house tournament, according to Norconk. They will pair the boys according to weight and winners of each bout will receive ribbons.

Some of the boys in the program are returnees from last year. They have had fun in the past and are back to learn more

The goal of the program is to expose the elementary students to the sport of wrestling and get them excited about taking part in the high school program.

The ultimate goal is that a program such as the one sponsored by the PTA will allow the boys to realize that wrestling can be fun, and, in the future, help improve the success of the Black Knights varsity wrestling programs in the years ahead.

The program held during recess at the Lehman-Jackson Elementary School is conducted for the same reason. The program has the same type format but since it deals with only fifth and sixth grade students, the exercises and instruction is more advanced. That it is popular is evidenced by the fact that about 30 of the district's 60 participants come out for the program at the Lehman-Jackson building.

Under the guidance of Varsity Coach Ed Ladamus, assistant coaches Dwight Barbacci, Thomas Williams, Gary Norconk, Vito Pilosi or Rusty Coolbaugh, it is hoped the program will gain in popularity each


