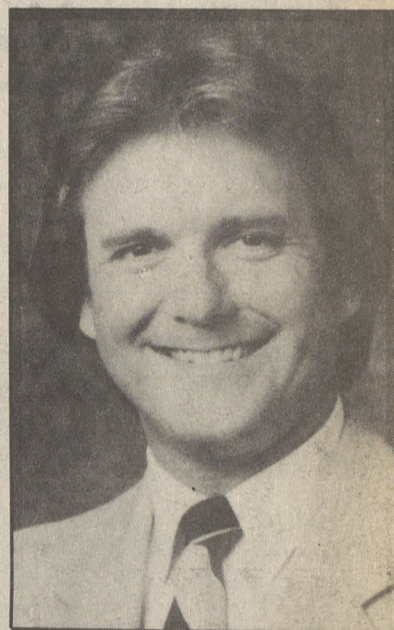
Former Phillies pitcher speaks for Easter Seals
