The Lady Bucks, however, had already built up a lead that they stretched to ten points by the end of the second period. Dallas trailed at halftime, 47-37.

Brokenshire pulled off a fast steal early in the third period, which was followed by a blocked shot from Angie Kern. Dunmore outscored Dallas 15-10 in that period and built up a 15 point lead, 52-37 by the end of the period.

The Dallas defense held the Lady Bucks from scoring until 6:58 and didn't allow another field goal until 5:40. Dunmore's Kathy Maguire was frustrated as she tried to score at her goal three times in a row, but she was blocked each time by a Dallas defender.

But, however good the defense worked was counterbalanced by the offense losing the ball before it found its way to the basket. The Lady Mountaineers were unable to score until 4:35 when Cook hit on a field goal.

With three minutes to go Dallas was trailing 61-39. Dunmore's pressure defense caused them to miss at the basket several times, or the game may have had a very different outcome.

Locals spark Spinners

Four area girls sparked the Greater Wilkes-Barre YMCA Spinners gymnastics team to a 3-0 record so far this season.

The team, after an early January win over East Stroudsburg YMCA, beat the Scranton YMCA Pirouettes and then the previously unbeaten Wayne County YMCA Aerialettes in recent action.

The Spinners beat Scranton 140.2 to 138.8. Rachel Holthaus, a ninth grader at Dallas Jr. High and Michelle Sandstrom a fifth grader at Lake Noxen Elementary, led the Spinners with 28.9 and 26.3 all around total points respectively.

Holthaus, who resides at Norton Avenue, Dallas, won the floor exercise (8.3) and placed second on the uneven bars (6.5), balance beam

(6.5), vaulting (7.6) and in the all-around total for her 14-and-over age group.

Sandstrom, of Harveys Lake, won the beam (6.5) and was second on bars (6.6), third on floor (7.2) and second in all-around for the 9-11 age class.

Jennifer Birt, also of Harveys Lake, won the floor exercise in the 8-and-under age group with a superb 6.6 score. Emily Slaff, a student at Dallas Twp., also competed in the 8-and-under class.

Next, the Spinners beat Wayne County 122.6 to 111.2. Sandstrom was third (5.3) on the floor and in the all-around (21.0). Jennifer Birt was second on the floor (5.3) and Emily Slaff turned in a strong performance on the floor and beam.
