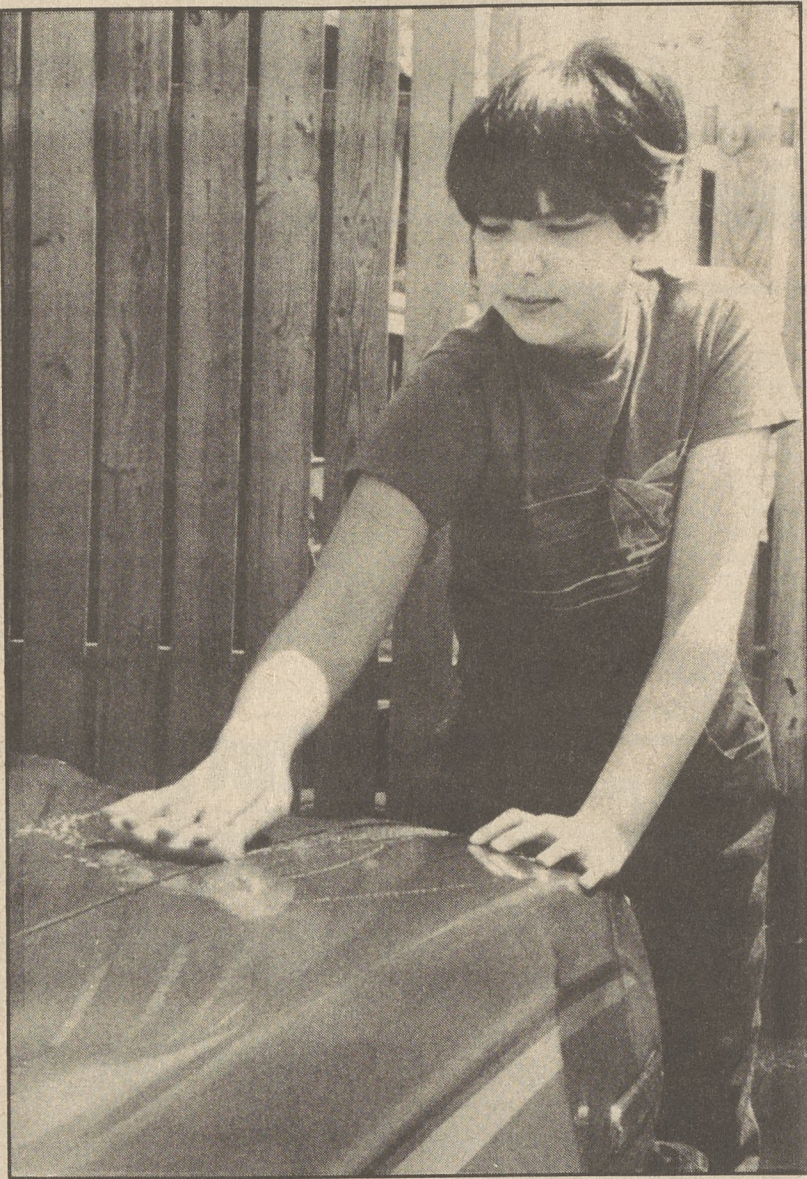
Camp named LCCC dean

"Brighton Beach Memoirs" — another Neil Simon comedy about two families during the Great Depression (46th Street Theater, W. 46th St., 221-1211)

"Corpse!" — comedy thriller (Helen Hayes Theater)

"42nd Street" — hit remake of the movie classic (Majestic Theater, W. 44th St., 239-6200)

"I'm Not Rappaport" — comedy about two elderly men who meet in Central Park, starring Judd Hirsch (Booth Theater)

"Jerry's Girls" — revue featuring Chita Rivera and Leslie Uggams (St. James Theater)

"La Cage aux Folles" — Jerry Herman-Harvey Fierstein musical based on a French comedy (Palace Theater, 1564 Broadway, 757-2626)

"Oh! Calcutta!" — long running musical (Edison Theater, W. 47th St., 302-2302)

"Precious Sons" — play about two parents and their teenage sons (Longacre Theater)

"Singin' in the Rain" — remake of the musical classic (Gershwin Theater, W. 52nd St., 586-6510)

"Song and Dance" — musical about an English girl looking for love in New York and Beverly Hills.
