# 11-0! Dallas girls still undefeated

The Dallas girls' softball team ran its record to 11-0 last week by winning four games in five days. The Lady Mountaineers scored 11 runs in the third inning, Friday, against Hazleton to win 15-5 and led by Joyce Tinner's three-run homer scored nine runs in the fifth inning to take GAR 13-3 in five innings, Wednesday. Entry fee for individual who register prior to the date of the race will be \$5 while registration on the day of the race will be \$6.


