rea women honored at event

Five area women and one local service organization were honored as leaders in the community at the recent Third Annual Luzerne County Women's Conference held at the campus of Penn State Wilkes-Barre. They received the 1986 Pathfinder's Award, which each year is awarded to county residents or organizations for having paved new ground for women in the areas of politics, business, community endeavors, education and the arts. This year's awards honored women in education.

This year's six recipients are:

Madge Benovitz of Kingston, who is the first woman from Luzerne County to serve on the National Association of State Boards of Education - Government Affairs Committee from 1984-85 and presently serves on the Board of Directors.

Patricia Davis, of Dallas, the first woman to chair the Wilkes College Board of Trustees. She was elected to the office in May, 1984 after serving on the Wilkes Board since 1976.

Nancy Noonan, of Forty Fort, who has served as president of the Pennsylvania State Education Association since 1983. Prior to this she was PSEA vicepresident from 1978-1983

Susan Sordoni, of Harveys Lake, the first lay person elected as Chairperson of the Board of College Misericordia, 1979-1980. Prior to this, she served on th College's Board from 1974-1983.

Anne Vernon, retiring Director of Family Service Association and one of the first two women elected to the Dallas Area School Board, and the only woman to serve as the Dallas school Board President.

The Negro Women's Community League, which established a scholarship fund 35 years ago to encourage the pursuit of education in the black community. Each year the League presents two scholarships to a local young man and woman who has excelled scholastically. Joyce Truesdale Davis has headed the effort.

Dr. Kurello's practice will include: pediatric, adolescent, and geriatric health care, as well as, emergency medicine, gynecology, and minor surgical procedures.



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
