Twp. solicitor squashes rumors

Solicitor Charles Bartlett emphasized to Lehman Township supervisors and residents at the board's regular monthly meeting that the members of the Municipal Authority are receiving no compensation for their services.

Bartlett dispelled rumors circulating about the township that board members serving on the Municipal Authority were receiving free sewers. He also told the audience that contrary to rumor, curbing was not a part of the Oak Hill Sewer Project. Bartlett told supervisors that he was very pleased with the work

being done and the engineer and that 300 feet of line was being laid daily.

The board accepted a low bid of \$22,401 on the purchase of a 1986 one-ton dump truck from Bear Ford. A low bid of \$5,656.99 from Tom Bower for seal work and a bid of \$33,740.93 from I.A. Construction Company in Muncy for tar and chip work.

In new business, William Boccus was promoted to police sergeant with a salary increase of \$50.00 a month.

Complaints about water runoff caused by a clogged pipe in the township inspired supervisors to look into the formation of a local ordinance restricting the dumping of debris or garbage in the gutters.

township has to go up and clean it. Plus, the people that go there and want to put their boats in the water don't like seeing these guys sitting on their cars drinking all the time."

Potzer said the township doesn't have a heavy problem, but they do want to crack down on those who abuse public lots and thoroughfares by littering and possibly presenting safety and health hazards.

"This ordinance isn't going to affect people who want to have parties in their homes," Potzer explained. "That is private property. That's fine. This ordinance only pertains to public places."

Specifically, those places include: streets, alleys, roads, parks, public grounds, public places or public vacant lots.

Any person who violates the ordinance will be subject, upon conviction, to pay a fine of not less than \$25 and court costs. Failure to pay
