


Dr. John Carey, a specialist in arthritis and reheumatology, conducts the program which provides arthritis patients with a complete physical examination and treatment plan. The results are forwarded to the patient's physican for consultation input and followup care.

Patients requiring orthopedic or corrective surgery or extensive physical therapy are tested with a multidisciplinary approach known as CORE (Combined Orthopedic and Rheumatologic Evaluation).



The program is open to the public and is free-of-charge for those covered in full by Blue Cross (non-Medicare) plans. Participants must be referred by a physician and are required to attend all four sessions. (Cost for non-Blue Cross subscribers is \$165.)
