State Capitol roundup

 Here is a summary of important events that occurred on Capitol Hill last week from Rep. Frank Coslett, 120th Legislative District.
CAPITOL EXPANSION COMMITTEE - A meeting of the special House committee investigating the Capitol expansion project was opened to the public this week when the panel's Republican chairman objected to plans to bar the public from

the session. Rep. Jeffrey E. Piccola (R-Dauphin) blasted the committee's Democratic leader for scheduling a last-minute closed executive session. Piccola said the move to close the session was in violation of House rules and the state's Sunshine Law. "The chairman has no right to close a meeting to the press and public without the agreement of the majority of committee members," Piccola said. As a result of Piccola's objections, the meeting was opened to the press and public.
COMBATING

DRUG TRAFFICKING - Legislators from Pennsylvania, Maryland and West Virginia will meet in Hagerstown, Md., on Sept. 17 at a public hearing into the growing problem of drug trafficking and underage drinking in Pennsylvania, Maryland and West Virginia. Rep. Terry Punt (R-Franklin) announced this week that law enforcement and government officials, judicial officers, social service professionals and members of the general public have been invited to testify. In July, at a tri-state conference of legislators hosted by

Punt, it was unanimously agreed that drug trafficking and underage drinking were problems of the tri-state region. "We're attempting to get an idea of the scope of the problem and the efforts being made to combat it," Punt said. "We're also looking into the possibility of establishing a tri-state task force to battle drug and alcohol abuse."

petition December 19 and 20, 1986 at Somers, PA to coincide with the Keystone Shepard Symposium. Each contestant will receive a yard of wool from the Scranton Fabric Center.
