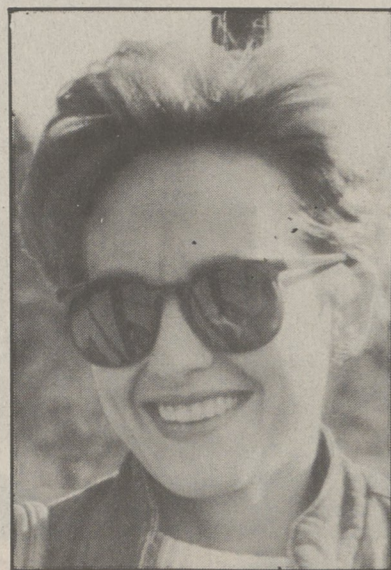


The Post asks:

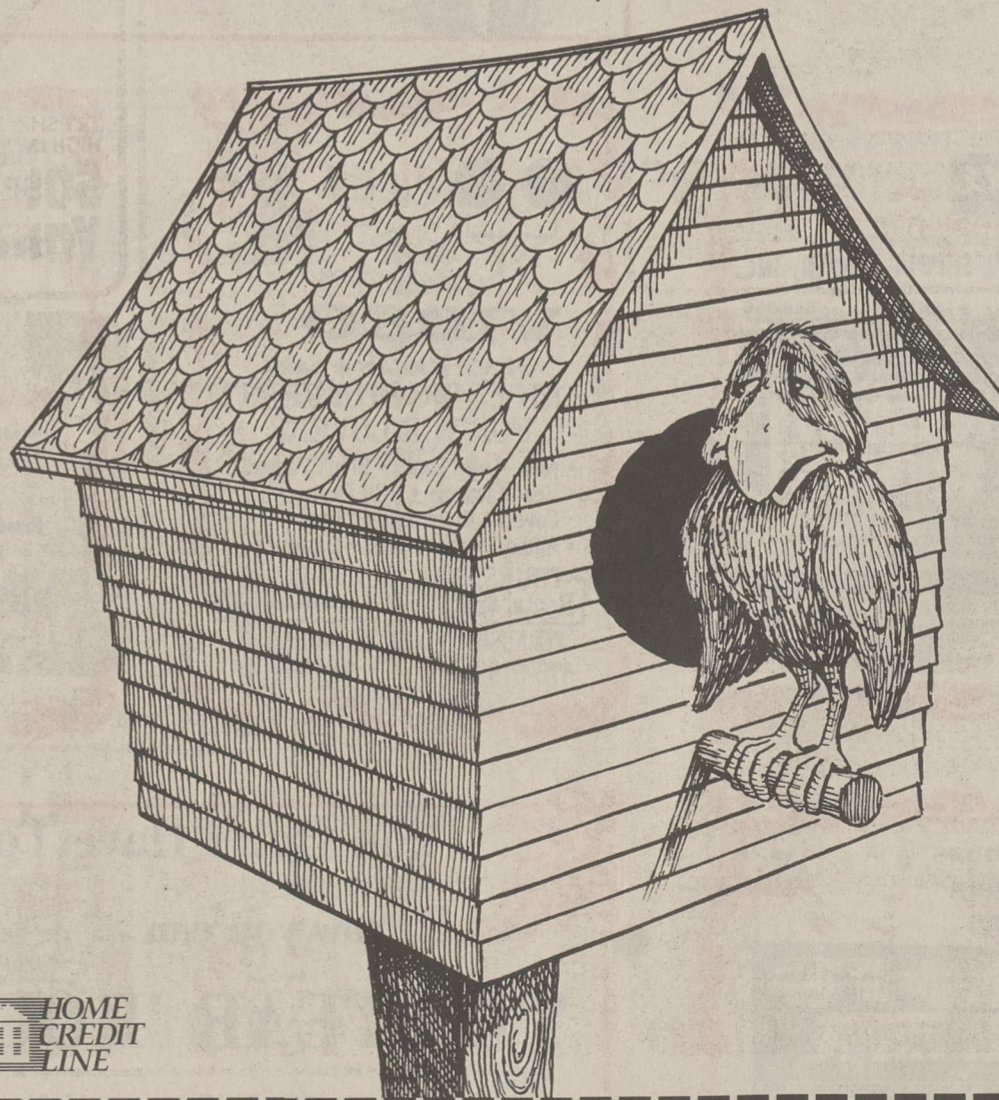
