Statue will fulfill Vietnam vets' dreams

Although funding for the Luzerne County Vietnam Memorial statue is moving right along, committee members say they will still accept donations to help fulfill their dream.

The donations are coming in a lot faster," said Michael Balash, of RD 3, Dallas, vicechairman of the committee. "We are hoping to raise between \$40,000 and \$45,000, but if anyone would like to help out with a donation, we would certainly appreciate it."

The statue, an 8'3' copper and bronze model which will stand on a 10 foot limestone base, is expected to be in place by next September on the South Lawn of the Luzerne County Courthouse.

"We approached the commissioners and laid out our plans for what we wanted to do," Balash explained. "And they were very cooperative and should be commended for what they have done. They said they would help as much as they can and they did."

The idea of erecting a statue to commemorate the MIA's (Missing in Action), POW's (Prisoners of War), and KIA's (Killed in Action) of the Vietnam War began last December. Ten thousand Luzerne County residents served in Vietnam and 75 of them were killed there.

"That's where we started laying the groundwork - who would be chairman - and so forth. But there are places all over the country that have something to honor the Vietnam veterans and we thought this area should have one, too. It was a long

Balash, who served in the Air Force from 1969 to 1972 and who saw some time in Vietnam (non combat), said he believes the Memorial will be good for the local verterans.

"Personally, I think it will bring them closer together as individuals," Balash said. "It will be a place where they can go: where they can grieve a

Although Balash spent most of his time in Thailand where he was a security policeman (canine handler), he knows what things could have been like for him during his stint.

"You think about some of the areas you were in and some of the things you went through,' Balash recalled. "You wonder what it could have been like to be a POW or a MIA. You don't think about it all the time. But, there are times when you think
