PA CPA's sponsoring student competition

The Pennsylvania Institute of Certified Public Accountants (PICPA) is sponsoring its 13th annual Student Manuscript Competition. Robert C. Lightburn, CPA, chairman of the "Pennsylvania CPA Journal" Editorial Board, related that, "The purpose of the contest is to encourage college students to address those issues which will affect the future of the accounting profession."

The competition is open to all junior, senior and graduate students majoring in accounting at Pennsylvania colleges and universities. A committee com-

posed of CPAs in public accounting, industry, government and education will review the manuscripts. Cash awards of \$1,000, \$600 and \$400 respectively will be awarded for the three best articles. In addition, accounting societies which submit the winning manuscripts on behalf of individual students will receive a matching grant. Over \$16,700 in prize money has been awarded to students since the Student Manuscript Competition began in 1976.

The first place winning article will be published in the summer 1988 issue of the "Pennsylvania CPA Journal."
