Farm survey to be taken

Interviewers will begin knocking on the doors of 500 Pennsylvania farmers next week for the fourth-annual Farm Costs and Returns Survey.

The major, nationwide survey of costs of production and financial conditions throughout the farm sector is conducted by the state offices of the National Agricultural Statistics Service, a branch of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Across the nation, 24,000 farmers will be contracted. The 500 Commonwealth farm operators will be surveyed between Feb. 19 and March 21 by representatives of the Pennsylvania Agriculture Statistics Service (PASS).

State Statistician Wally Evans said interviewers will collect data on farm expenses, finances, capital purchases and costs of production for 1987. The information will be used to determine farm production expenditures, measure farm income, and assess other key indicators of the farm sector.

"This survey is important to Pennsylvania farmers, because in addition to national results, state-level information will be published," Evans said.

Responses to survey questionnaires are confidential and are only used with other reports to arrive at state and national totals. The results will be published by USDA in various reports scheduled for release beginning this summer.
