Saori Nakagawa, petite, dark-haired senior at Dallas High School, came to the United States from Chiba, Japan, last August as a Rotary Exchange student. She is presently staying with her host American parents, Lee and Nancy Eckert.

Saori is fascinated by the beauty of the scenery in this part of the country and last week was looking forward enthusiastically to a visit to Philadelphia an Beaver College.

Unable to speak English when she first came to America, Aosri has learned not only to speak our language but also to understand it. She has difficulty with some words but when people speak slowly(she usually grasps their meaning very well.

"The high school is very large," said Saori. "At home although our school is five stories high, it is not as large as here and we have only one athletic field.

We wear uniforms in school at home which is good, because no one knows the difference between rich or poor students," Saori said.

The young Japanese girl said that at home there are lots of trains but here she has seen none. She likes to swim and since her mother is a swimming instructor, Saori went swimming quite often. She hasn't gone often since she is here because it is too far to the city and

Saori is proud of the fact that she was a member of the Dallas High School basketball team this season and said she thoroughly enjoyed it. There are many more sports in the local high school than at home. In Chiba, there was no football and no racquet ball, only

soccer and rugby. Although there are some MacDonald's, Pizza Huts, Mr. Donut, Wendy's and Dunkin' Donuts at home, Saori said the daily meals of Americans are different. At home their main food wasrice, in the United States it is meatand potatoes. She never saw nortasted bagels until coming to America and they are now one of her favorite foods.

Courses in the school are different, according to Saori because in Japan, the teachers select the students' subjects and students remain in their home room with only the teachers moving from one classroom to another. Their classes are from 8;40 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday and from 8;40 to noon on Saturday. The attend scho7\$ from April to March with vacation time in July and August after their tests. The school term is divided into three semesters.

Saori said that food in the United States is cheaper than at home, especially ice cream and meat. Since living here, she has tasted turkey and deer meat for the first time. At home, they eat lots of fish, chicken, pork, and

Saori enjoys the mountains and valleys here and enjoys skiing. There is no snow where she lives in Japan but she went to the mountains

The students dress much more casually heRe than they do in Japan. Saori said at home the students wear skirts not jeans as they do in the school here.

Saori said because of the language barrier in the first few months, she did not make as many friends as she would like to but she has met some and enjoys going to the movies and school dances. She is hoping that someone invites her to the school prom.

When she finishes her senior year, Saori hopes to take and pass some entrance tests so

she can go to school in America. "I would like to stay here and attend college, this country is so beautiful," Saori
