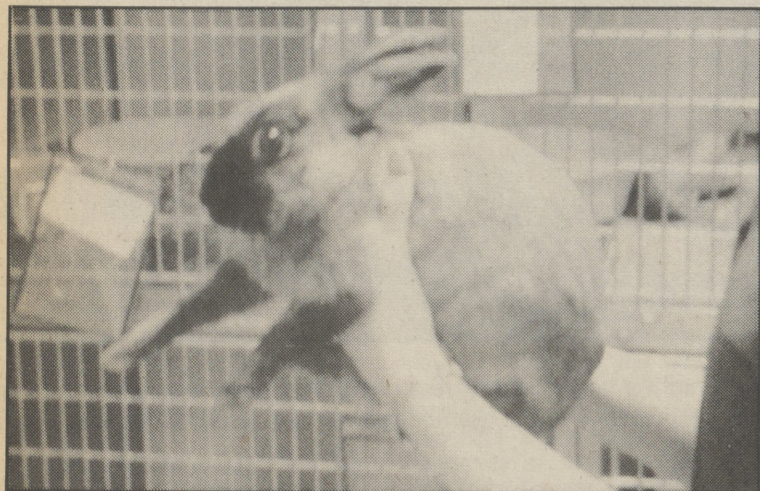
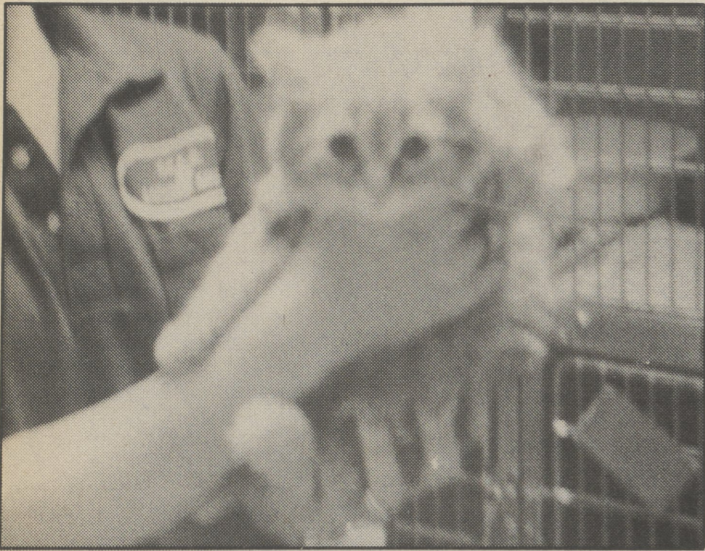


'Round the Mountain
