

An art educator for 27 years and an art therapist for 10, Sister Dorothy was involved with art education at her alma mater College Misericordia in Dallas for 15 years. She was director of graduate studies at the University of Scranton for two years in a cooperative program between Misericordia and the University.

On June 1, Sister Dorothy began a year-long sabbatical leave from Marywood, where she founded the art therapy program seven years

She will join the art education delegation to China in Seattle, WA, next month. The group will convene on July 13 and return there on Aug. 3 after traveling to five cities -Beijing, Xi'an, Shanghai, Guilin and Hong Kong.

The citizen ambassadors will meet with Chinese artists and art educators of major universities to share ideas and experiences as well as the content and method of art instruction at all levels. The delegates will also exchange information about programs for the gifted, the role of art history, crafts, and music education.

The China Association for the Advancement of International Friendship, which is under the Ministry of Culture, is working with the Citizen Ambassador Program to arrange visits to schools and art academies.
