

# **Black Knights crush Northwest Rangers 48-6**

Lake-Lehman Coach Rich Gorgone was concerned that his Black Knights might have a letdown after their upset of the Hanover Hawkeyes the opening day of the season.

It appeared Gorgone might be correct in his thinking Saturday afternoon in their game with Northwest when the Rangers took the ball on the opening play of the game and ran it back for a 72-yd. touchdown. Jackson said it's difficult to assess the Warriors since it's so early in the season but in his opinion they are the best in the Conference.


## **Dallas, Lake-Lehman field hockey** teams start seasons on winning note
