

The ECIA Chapter I Reading and Math programs are currently underway at the Lake-Lehman School District. Students will be screened with the Metropolitan Achievement Test for Math, and the Gates-MacGinitie Test for Reading. Any student who qualifies for

instruction based on the screening tests is then tested individually for specific problems. Results of these tests will be used to develop a prescription for each child's individual needs.
