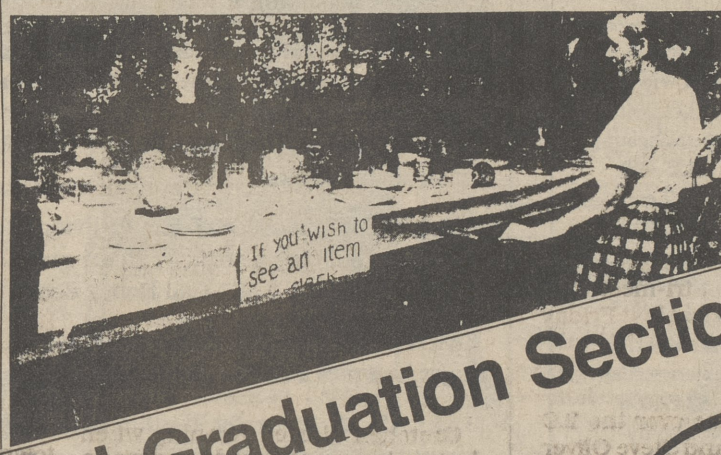

Dallas fire was arson

An arson barn fire in Dallas Township is under investigation by state police. The fire destroyed a barn on Edinger Hill Road near Lower Demunds Road late Saturday night. Fire Chief Robert Bessecker said the fire, which struck a 2 1/2-story barn owned by Leo Flynn, is the first barn fire in this district since a rash of arson occurred in the Back Mountain last year. After visiting the scene Monday to investigate the scene, state police fire marshal Nicholas Gushka confirmed that it was arson, but would not elaborate on the details of the investigation. The Dallas area fire company and state police will be cooperating in the investigation. It is not known at this time whether or not Saturday's fire is related to the rash of arson last year, but that possibility will be investigated. The fire, reported at approximately 11:25 p.m., had engulfed the structure by the time firefighters from Dallas, Kunkle and Franklin Township arrived. The fire blazed for a few minutes before the fire company was alerted. Mr. Leo



Harveys Lake condo plan is opposed

A plan for the first major subdivision at Harveys Lake brought a roomful of concerned Lake residents to the Harveys Lake planning commission meeting Monday night. And though the commission had already granted preliminary approval for the project, residents made it known that they would continue to oppose it. The proposal is for 29 townhouses on 3 1/2 acres near Barnum Street. The Harveys Lake Amusement Park area is being subdivided by Hanson's Amusement Corporation, which is headed by Al Morrow. The townhouses are slated to go up behind Morrow's property on Lake side Drive. The application is the first major subdivision ever proposed for Harveys Lake. An attorney representing Al-Sar should never have been granted approval. Michael J. Hudacek, an attorney representing the Harveys Lake Amusement Corporation, claimed that the building would not need until quality tests are done to meet Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Department of Environmental Resources (DER) standards. The developers made several changes since the initial proposal in July the fate of the development will be further debated before the borough zoning hearing board. The board will decide if preliminary approval is properly granted, and if so it will be granted. The Harveys Lake Amusement Corporation is reviewing the zoning requirements.
