Howard Grossman named Planner of the Year in state

Howard J. Grossman, Executive Director of the Economic Development Council of Northeastern Pennsylvania (EDCNP) since 1971, recently was honored with its Professional Planner of the Year Award from the Pennsylvania Planning Association (PPA) at a statewide awards dinner held in State College. The Association, a chapter of the American Planning Association, recognized Grossman for "outstanding achievements over the past 17 years."

Presented by State Senator J. Doyle Corman, the award "signified many years of outstanding professional achievement in a difficult and demanding field," said John E. Walsh, President and General Manager of WVIA-TV and president of EDCNP, who nominated Grossman for the honor.

A native of New Jersey, Grossman earned an undergraduate degree in city planning from Rutgers University, a master's degree in public administration from New York University, and took additional graduate work toward a Ph.D. at the University of Pennsylvania in its school of city planning.

Active in education and community service organizations, Grossman has served as an adjunct professor at Wilkes College and has taught at Marywood and Luzerne County Community College. In addition, he contributes regular columns to regional publications, and has authored numerous papers and studies. He had been previously honored by the National Association of Development Organizations with its J. Roy Fogle Award as the outstanding executive director of a multi-county planning and development organization in the United States.
