Dallas Peer Helpers welcome new students



Penn State lab to be named for C-TEC

The telecommunications technology laboratory in the new Penn State Wilkes-Barre Center for Technology will be named the C-TEC Telecommunications Laboratory. C-TEC was one of the first contributors to the fundraising campaign to build the facility, donating \$50,000 for a laboratory. Cosntruction on the new center began this week. The \$3.5 million Center will house laboratories in engineering technology, classrooms, a teleconference auditorium and an astronomy dome. The Center will open for classes in the Fall of 1989.

Representatives of C-TEC and its subsidiary, Commonwealth Telephone, have worked closely with Penn State Wilkes-Barre faculty on the development of the campus tele-communications technology pro-gram which began in 1980. More than 30 campus telecommunica-tions technology alumni now work for the company.




