Sandy Dicton named PAIAW All-Star

Lake-Lehman High School graduate Sandy Dicton, a senior mathematics major at Ursinus College, has been named to the Philadelphia Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (PAIAW) All-Star team. Dicton received the honor along with teammate Barb Wenny. She was also honored by the College Field Hockey Coaches Association, being named honorable mention on the Mid-East Regional team.

Dicton led Ursinus in defensive saves the past two seasons. This year, the captain had 13 as Ursinus went 6-9-3. She made 11 saves last year as Ursinus won five of 19 games

and tied three.

Dicton earned both all-American and Academic all-American honors last season. With a 3.7 average, she's a candidate to earn double honors again this year.

At Lake-Lehman, Dicton set a national high school record with 17 assists in 1984, leading her team to the District 2 crown and winning MVP honors. She also earned the league MVP award in softball and

made first-team all-league in basketball. Both the softball and basketball teams won district titles during her senior year.

Dicton, a dean's list student at Ursinus, was recently named to "Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities."

She ranked second in her high school class, made the National Honor Society, and was named "Who's Who in U.S. High Schools."
