

## Dallas matmen upset Lake-Lehman

Coming off a mild 27-22 upset over previously undefeated Lake-Lehman, the Dallas Mountaineers go into this week's competition with a positive

103-lb. Pat Morris started the Mountaineers with six points on a forfeit. The Knights moved the score to 6-3 on Charlie Roper's 2-0 decision over Rick Hoyes and 119 Chris Smith tied the match at 6-6 by decisioning Mount Dale Morris 3-2.

125-lb. Matt Balberchak wrestled to an 8-8 draw with R. Pfeiffer to move the score to 8-8. The Mountaineers moved in front 17-8 after 130 Jim Newell took Tom Duffy 2-0. 135-lb. Jim Farrell decisioned Jason Clancy 3-0 and 140-lb. Jim O'Donnell defeated Terry Martin 4-2.

145-lb. Mike Guerin gave the Knights three by decisioning Jamie Janosky 4-1. Then 152lb. Jamie Strange drew 7-7 with P.J. Goodwin. 160-lb. Jerry Ogurkis took a 16-2 major decision from Tom Tereska to put the score at 23-13. 171-lb. Ray Rosencrans decisioned Wade Post 3-2 for three points for the Knights but 189-lb. Ron Post major decisioned J.J. Konigus to put the Mountaineers in front 27-16. Hwt. Ed Kelly ended the match by pinning Dave Pitcavage to move the final score to 27-22.

"We have to look ahead this week," Ladamus said. "We have Hanover Wednesday. They're down this week but they can be tough. We have Wyoming Area Saturday and they're tied at the top. They are tough in their light weights but not as strong in the upper weights. We're matched pretty evenly, but we won't be able to let them get too far ahead in the lower weights."


