Free medical school available for service

Eligible students may be able to receive a tuition-free medical education in return for a commitment to serve seven years in the military, according to Rep. George C. Hasay.

The program, offered by the Uniformed University of the Health Sciences (USUHS) in Bethesda, Maryland, provides a free medical education while students serve on active duty and receive a full officer's pay.

Hasay said the students must serve seven years in the medical department of the Army, Navy, Air Force or the Public Health Service after completing school.

In addition to meeting the academic and personal qualifications of the school, applicants must be U.S. citizens between 18 and 27 and meet the requirements for commission in the uniformed services.

PSU staff reaches fund goal

The Faculty/staff division of the Penn State Wilkes-Barre Annual Fund Campaign has topped its division goal of \$9,000. The Annual Fund campaign goal is \$100,000, which is used to support scholarships and special faculty projects at the campus. Students should have a good academic record and desire to experience another culture and language through living with a

warm and giving volunteer family. Academic year and shorter term summer vacation programs are available.
