## Free medical school available for service

Eligible students may be able to receive a tuition-free medical education in return for a commitment to serve seven years in the mili-tary, according to Rep. George C. Hasay

The program, offered by the Uniformed University of the Health Sciences (USUHS) in Bethesda, Maryland, provides a free medical education while students serve on active duty and receive a full officer's pay.

Hasay said the students must serve seven years in the medical department of the Army, Navy, Air Force or the Public Health Service after completing school.

In addition to meeting the academic and personal qualifications of the school, applicants must be U.S. citizens between 18 and 27 and meet the requirements for




## PSU staff reaches fund goal
