Phase I. The advantage of the program is that it gives professional staff members, kindergarten through 12th grade, the opportunity to sit with a peer and go over the program such as planning a

"The kindergarten teacher must use the same techniques as the senior high teacher," Howanitz explained. "It's not the same subject but it is the same technique. At the end of the four-day course, the teachers come back for a one-day maintenance and review of essential elements. Dallas is one of the few schools having the program. Pittston Area has one and other areas are considering the program."

The program does cost money but the Dallas district has cut corners wherever possible. Howanitz, who has tenure, would be paid for teaching in a classroom, if he were not doing staff development. The other expense is a sub-

the four-day course.

Phase II, classroom management, is next. This will be a twoday workshop which will include environment, management of curriculum, classroom arrangement, and cooperative groups working together.

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
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
