They are Patti Reed, Dena Rebennack, Tracy Hunter, Holly Bachman, Julianne Orlowski and Randi Harvey, seniors; Lynn Bednar, Laura Pounton, Stephanie Andrasko, Amy Burgerhoff, Wendy Hozempa, juniors and Melani Langdon and Molly Connolly, sophomores.
