Daniel A. Waters, 94, of Cash- and spent 13 months in France. man Road, Gettysburg, died July Nursing Home, Gettysburg.

and respected resident of Dallas, a regular basis. known to many as a dedicated historian and geneologist. He was the author of numerous historical works including the history of the Dallas United Methodist Church, one entitled Yankees in Northeastern Pennsylvania in conjunction with the Bicentennial of Wyoming Valley, and most recently in 1967 he wrote the History of Dallas which was published and is the most complete history of Dallas and its surrounding area.

Waters was also a dedicated and more. thorough geneologist and traced his family geneology back to the 700's A.D. through Charlemagne's time and had it all authenticated.

Before leaving his home on Huntsville Road, Dallas to move to Gettysburg with his wife Blanche K., in 1977, Daniel Waters contributed a great deal to the Back Mountain communities. The father of two boys, James S.
