Volunteer ambulances to receive more state aid

Pennsylvania's volunteer ambulance services will receive higher fees for the emergency transport of medical assistance clients starting Aug. 1, State Welfare Secretary John F. White Jr. announced today.

It is the first such increase in a dozen years.

White said the fees will increase from \$30 to \$60 per emergency transport by Volunteer Ambulance Service Certified (VASC) organizations and from \$20 to \$50 per trip by non-VASC operations.

Volunteer ambulance services are certified by the state Health Department on the basis of varied criteria, including type of equipment, training levels of personnel, ability to communicate directly with hospitals and record keeping practices.

White also said that medical assistance fees will be provided for the first time to Advanced Life Support (ALS) certified ambulance services. They will receive \$100 per emergency trip.


