Steve Oliver of Midway Manor, Shavertown, returned home last week from a 10-day trip as delegate for the Annual United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth, sponsored by the five lodges of District 20 of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. Steve was one of 32 students and adults from Pennsylvania and five from Virginia who met in Harrisburg and from there traveled by bus to Niagara Falls. There, they stayed overnight on the Canadian side of the Falls, toured the area and went up in the skylift at night.

"I would like to return there sometime and spend more time, "Steve said. "If possible I'd like to go under the Falls if they still have those tours."

The following day, the travelers left Niagara Falls and headed toward Cobourg, Canada, where they met their host families and spent the night. Some of the travelers stayed with families in the town and were able to tour historical sites, but Steve and several others stayed with a family who had a cabin on a lake which led to Lake Ontario - a pleasant experience, according to Steve.

After leaving Cobourg, the travelers headed toward Montreal where they spent the day visiting the science building. "That was very interesting to me," Steve said, "Since I want to study pharmacy after graduating from Dallas High School.

The bus was running ahead of schedule, so the travelers made it to Ottawa, Ontario where they

stayed for one night and took time out to visit the Canadian Parliament, which Steve felt was entirely different from the United States Government's sessions.

"The buildings were very old," Steve said, "And everything was much different than in the United States.

"When we finished sightseeing, we boarded the bus and left Canada and traveled through the New England states, stopping in Vermont for lunch and staying overnight in Nashua, New Hampshire where we went to see the ships passing through the locks."

Saturday, the bus left New Hampshire and traveled to Boston where the ambassadors went sightseeing Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning. They visited Boston Harbor, saw Old Ironsides and other historical sites. Later they left Boston and continued their journey to New York City, checking into the Southgate Tower Hotel,

which would be their home until June 21.

While in New York City, the travelers spent Monday and Tuesday at the United Nations where Steve learned that the U.N. does a lot more than work toward peace in the world.

They do a lot to solve hunger and disease problems in the world, especially in the third world nations," Steve explained.



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
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
