Idetown Couples Club still going strong 35 years after start

Thirty five years ago, the pastor of the Idetown United Methodist Church decided it might be a good idea to form a young couples club at the church - a club in which young couples belonging to the church could get together and plan some

social events of good fellowship. He invited all young couples, married or single to attend a meeting at the parsonage one evening during the week. At that first meeting three couples, and the pastor and his wife attended. Despite being few in number, those at the meeting were ex-

cited about the club and went out to recruit some of their friends. At the next meeting, a large number of interested couples came out. Among these were Henry Bergstrasser and his wife, who are still members of the club. In fact, Bergstrasser is president at the present time.

As the club grew in size, the members moved their meeting to the church house where they met regularly and planned various social events. After meeting for about a year and half, they decided to raise money to help underwrite expenses.

Some of the members suggested that they hold an auc-

tion. The others agreed and instead of a small committee, all of the members went out and solicited merchandise and stored it in RobertWilson's basement until the date of the first auction.

That first auction was held on property across the highway from where Kugler's Service Station is located. It went so well that Wilson estimated that the club had raised about, \$200 but when the members counted the proceeds they had more than \$800. They decided they had collected all the merchandise to be had that year, so they would not hold another auction. But the next year, people started

bringing the merchandise to the Couples Club, so they decided to hold a second auction and have now held one every year for 32 years. Robert Wilson serves as auctioneer and some of the other men help out. Bob Wilson's brother, Bill, also helps with the auction, according to Bergstras-

"We now have about 40 members in the club," Bergstrasser said. "We still call it the Couples Club, although we invite those who have lost their husbands or wives to join or continue as members. We have some good

"We meet the third Saturday of every month and we have

speakers come in and once a year we have a spaghetti supper which is prepared by the men, although there is one woman who prepares the sauce. Her husband used to do it; when he passed on she said she would like to do the sauce," Bergstrasser explained. "We also have a pancake supper every year and we also hold a Christmas Party.

"The money we make goes toward church improvements. Our club has paid for the vinyl siding and the members helped with the work."

Bergstrasser said the club often gets some unusual items for the auction. He said one year,


